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
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

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YOUR BRAIN **AND ADDICTION**



Knowing where addiction happens in the brain may help you and your healthcare professional make treatment choices

THERE ARE TWO PARTS OF THE BRAIN THOUGHT TO BE CONNECTED WITH ADDICTION

The cortex (outer layer of your brain) helps you do important things like think and plan, make decisions, and use reason to solve problems.

When you talk with a counselor, it's this cortex part of your brain that's at work.



The limbic system (part of the brain involved in behavior and emotions) makes you feel basic urges and drives, including feelings of happiness or satisfaction.

Medication for addiction targets this **limbic** part of your brain to treat addiction's physical effects on the body.

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

Your brain forms habits, good and bad

- Your brain creates habits around things you enjoy doing and avoids things that cause stress
- Habits can be hard to break because our brains are wired to repeat them
- Without you even knowing it, these habits can become harmful and overwhelming

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SOMETIMES, HABITS CAN LEAD **TO ADDICTION**



Dopamine's effects can hijack your brain

- **Dopamine**, a substance in your brain, gets released and makes you feel good when you do something you like
- This lets the brain know an activity is important to remember and can lead to cravings
- Intense cravings sometimes cause people to lose control and make bad choices, potentially hurting themselves and others

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
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Medication combined with counseling is a proven approach to treating addiction

- Medication-assisted treatment and counseling provide a whole-patient approach
- Medication along with counseling may help make changes to how your brain functions, so you can work your recovery program

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
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Learn about a once-monthly, extended-release treatment option for alcohol dependence and opioid dependence

- VIVITROL is a shot of **naltrexone medication** that is given by a healthcare professional once a month
- VIVITROL lasts up to 1 month—that's one less daily treatment decision—as you work your recovery program
- VIVITROL has been prescribed for alcohol dependence since 2006 and opioid dependence since 2010
- Do not receive VIVITROL if you are using or have a physical dependence on opioid-containing medicines or opioid street drugs, such as heroin, are having opioid withdrawal symptoms, or are allergic to naltrexone



IMPORTANT SAFETY INFORMATION (continued)

VIVITROL can cause serious side effects, including:

- Risk of opioid overdose (continued)
 - After you receive a dose of VIVITROL, its blocking effect slowly decreases and completely goes away over time. If you have used opioid street drugs or opioid-containing medicines in the past, using opioids in amounts that you used before treatment with VIVITROL can lead to overdose and death. You may also be more sensitive to the effects of **lower** amounts of opioids:
 - after you have gone through detoxification
 - when your next VIVITROL dose is due
 - if you miss a dose of VIVITROL
 - after you stop VIVITROL treatment

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
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VIVITROL and counseling may help interrupt the patterns of alcohol or opioid dependence

- · VIVITROL contains naltrexone, which is a blocking medication. This blocking helps prevent you from feeling the effects of alcohol and opioids
- VIVITROL is not habit-forming and is non-narcotic
- VIVITROL does not cause an unpleasant disulfiram-like reaction (such as vomiting) as a result of using opioids or drinking alcohol

THE BRAIN AND ALCOHOL USE

Endorphin (Naturally Occurring Opioid) Opioid Receptor

Alcohol use may cause a release of naturally occurring opioids called **endorphins** that bind to opioid receptors, contributing to the euphoric effects of alcohol use.



When opioid drugs are used, they bind to your body's opioid receptors, relieving pain and producing euphoria.

VIVITROL TREATMENT



VIVITROL works by binding to these opioid receptors, blocking endorphins and opioids so that you don't feel their effects. Do not try to overcome this blocking effect by taking large amounts of opioids—this can lead to serious injury, coma, or death.

IMPORTANT SAFETY INFORMATION (continued)

• Severe reactions at the site of injection. Some people on VIVITROL have had severe injection site reactions, including tissue death. VIVITROL must be injected by a healthcare provider. Call your healthcare provider right away if you notice any of the following at the injection site: intense pain, the area feels hard, large area of swelling, lumps, blisters, an open wound, a dark scab, or any reaction that concerns you, gets worse over time or does not get better within two weeks.

PATIENTS IN AN OUTPATIENT SETTING HAD **FEWER HEAVY DRINKING DAYS** PER MONTH* WITH VIVITROL AND COUNSELING **VS PLACEBO AND COUNSELING**

* Heavy drinking days were defined as 5 or more drinks per day for men and 4 or more drinks per day for women.

- In a clinical study of 624 patients with alcohol dependence, those who received VIVITROL and counseling had 25% fewer heavy drinking days per month* compared with those who received a placebo (injection without medication) and counseling
- Patients were studied for 6 months in an outpatient setting
- · Common side effects of VIVITROL may include nausea, sleepiness, headache, dizziness, vomiting, decreased appetite, painful joints, muscle cramps, cold symptoms, trouble sleeping, and toothache

* Opioid-free was defined as a negative urine drug test for opioids and no self-reported opioid use during weeks 5 to 24. Patients received individual drug counseling every other week.

- In a 6-month clinical study of 250 patients with opioid dependence who completed opioid detoxification, 36% of patients who received VIVITROL and counseling were opioid-free versus 23% of patients with placebo (injection with no medication) and counseling*
- Common side effects of VIVITROL may include nausea, sleepiness, headache, dizziness, vomiting, decreased appetite, painful joints, muscle cramps, cold symptoms, trouble sleeping, and toothache

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

Do not receive VIVITROL if you:

• are using or have a physical dependence on opioid-containing medicines or opioid street drugs, such as heroin. To test for a physical dependence on opioid-containing medicines or street drugs, your healthcare provider may give you a small injection of a medicine called naloxone. This is called a naloxone challenge test. If you get symptoms of opioid withdrawal after the naloxone challenge test, do not start treatment with VIVITROL at that time. Your healthcare provider may repeat the test after you have stopped using opioids to see whether it is safe to start VIVITROL.

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Do not receive VIVITROL® if you:

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- are having opioid withdrawal symptoms which may include anxiety, sleeplessness, yawning, fever, sweating, teary eyes, runny nose, goose bumps, shakiness, hot or cold flushes, muscle aches, muscle twitches, restlessness, nausea and vomiting, diarrhea, or stomach cramps.
- are allergic to naltrexone or any of the ingredients in VIVITROL or the liquid used to mix VIVITROL (diluent).

WHAT IS

VIVITROL?

Before you receive VIVITROL, tell your healthcare provider if you:

- have liver problems, use or abuse street drugs, have hemophilia or other bleeding problems, have kidney problems, or have any other medical conditions.
- are pregnant or plan to become pregnant. It is not known if VIVITROL will harm your unborn baby.
- are breastfeeding. It is not known if VIVITROL passes into your milk, and if it can harm your baby. Naltrexone, the active ingredient in VIVITROL, is the same active ingredient in tablets taken by mouth that contain naltrexone. Naltrexone from tablets passes into breast milk. Talk to your healthcare provider about whether you will breastfeed or take VIVITROL. You should not do both.

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HOW DOES

VIVITROL WORK?



Tell your healthcare provider about all the medicines you take, including prescription and non-prescription medicines, vitamins, and herbal supplements. Especially tell your healthcare provider if you take any opioid-containing medicines for pain, cough or colds, or diarrhea.

If you are being treated for alcohol dependence but also use or are addicted to opioid-containing medicines or opioid street drugs, it is important that you tell your healthcare provider before starting VIVITROL® to avoid having sudden opioid withdrawal symptoms when you start VIVITROL treatment.

What should I avoid while receiving VIVITROL?

Do not drive a car, operate machinery, or do other dangerous activities until you know how VIVITROL affects you. VIVITROL may make you feel dizzy and sleepy.

VIVITROL can cause other serious side effects, including:

- Depressed mood, which can sometimes lead to suicide, or suicidal thoughts, and suicidal behavior. You, a family member, or the people closest to you should call your healthcare provider right away if you have these thoughts or symptoms especially if they are new, worse, or worry you.
- Pneumonia caused by an allergic reaction. If this type of pneumonia happens to you, you may need to be treated in the hospital.
- Serious allergic reactions that can happen during or soon after an injection of VIVITROL. Tell your healthcare provider or get medical help right away if you have any of these symptoms, skin rash; swelling of your face, eyes, mouth, or tongue; trouble breathing or wheezing; chest pain; feeling dizzy or faint.
